THE DIRECTOR'S NOTES

Dear Supporters and Partners,

As Restore The Harvest, we are thrilled to reflect on the impactful journey of 2023 and the lives we've touched.

In 2023, we relocated our operations from Lilongwe to Salima, along the Lakeshore, expanding our reach into more rural communities. Our strategic partnership with schools commenced, starting with Lungumadzi Community Day Secondary School which will serve as a model for future agricultural education programs at other schools.

Lungumadzi was a central point, where we trained and equipped over 25 students in livestock farming. We developed and provided tailored training materials, fostering agricultural knowledge among both students and teachers. A tangible outcome of our efforts was the construction of phase one of the model farm on the school campus, serving as a practical tool for learners to understand meat rabbit production in this phase.

Beyond schools, we collaborate with community groups such as Tikondane, a village youth club comprising school dropouts eager to improve their lives. We trained them in meat rabbit production, empowering 19 youths with 3 rabbits each to kickstart their own ventures. Tikondane is a vibrant youth club, hungry for knowledge in livestock farming, and we're committed to their ongoing development.

As we step into 2024, we anticipate a year of growth and impact. Our goal is to expand our reach, touching more lives and making a meaningful difference. We aspire to ensure our training materials and resources are accessible to diverse groups, empowering them with valuable knowledge in livestock farming.

We express our gratitude for your continued support, which propels us forward in our mission to cultivate sustainable change.
